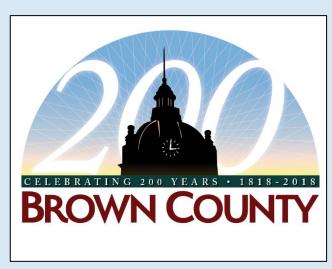
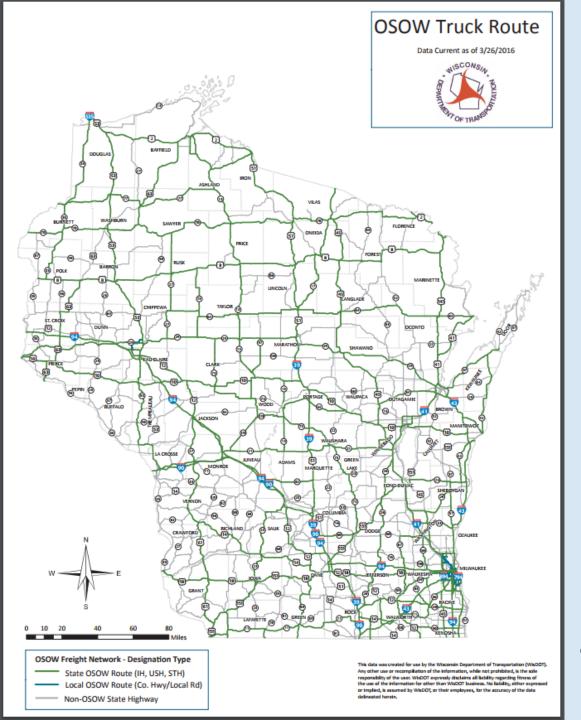

Wisconsin DOT OversizedOverweight (OSOW) Routes

Legal Maximums:

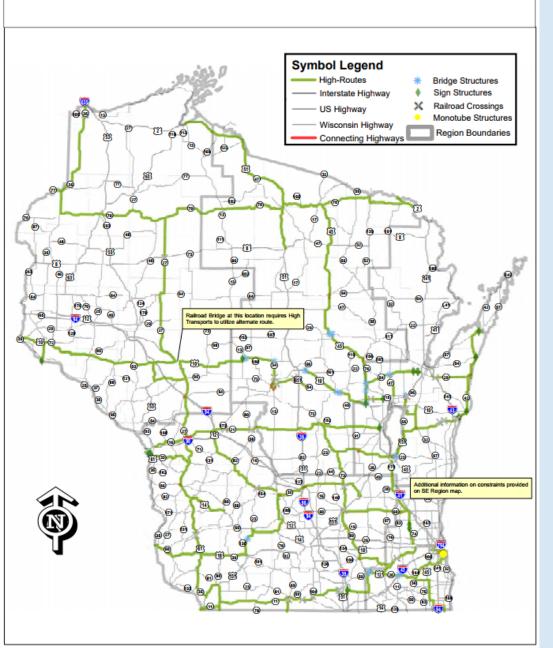
Width: 8' 6"

Length: 45' (1)/75' (2)

Weight: 80,000 lbs.

OSOW High Clearance Routes

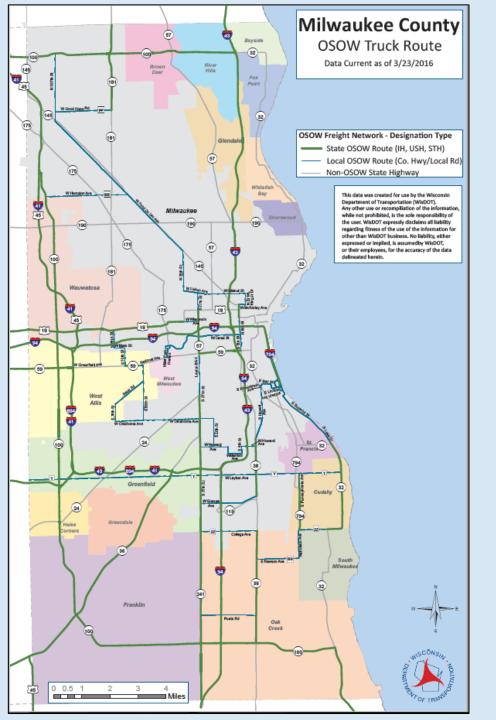


Wisconsin DOT Oversized-Overweight (OSOW) High Clearance Routes

Legal Maximum:

13' 6"

There are some exceptions to this maximum

 route system to ensure
 OSOW loads can be
 transported to and from

Wisconsin DOT OSOW Truck Routes in the Green Bay Area

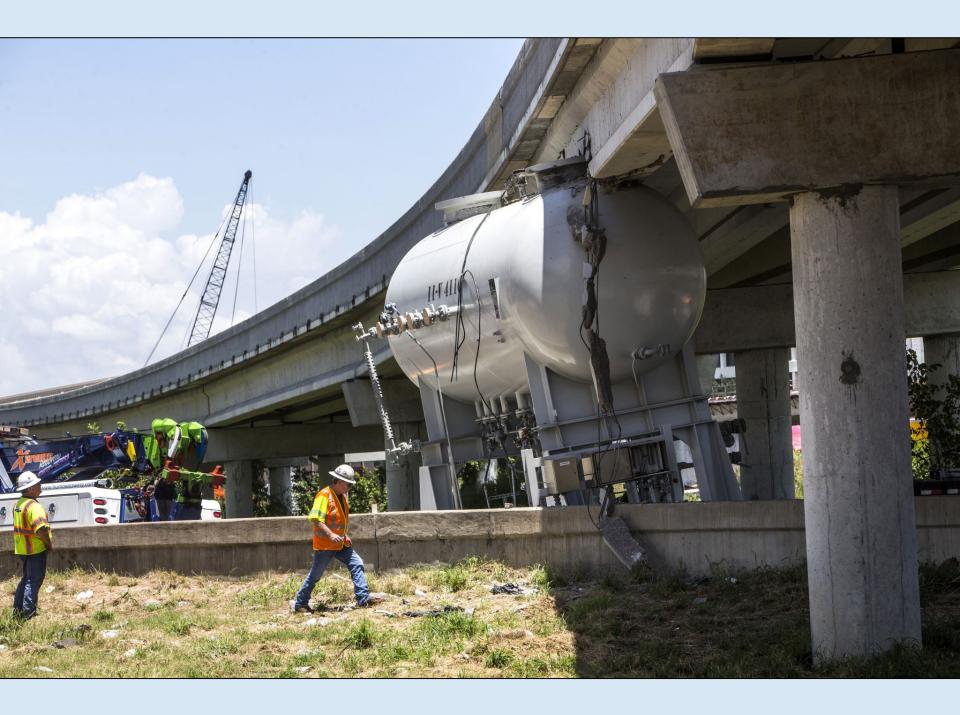


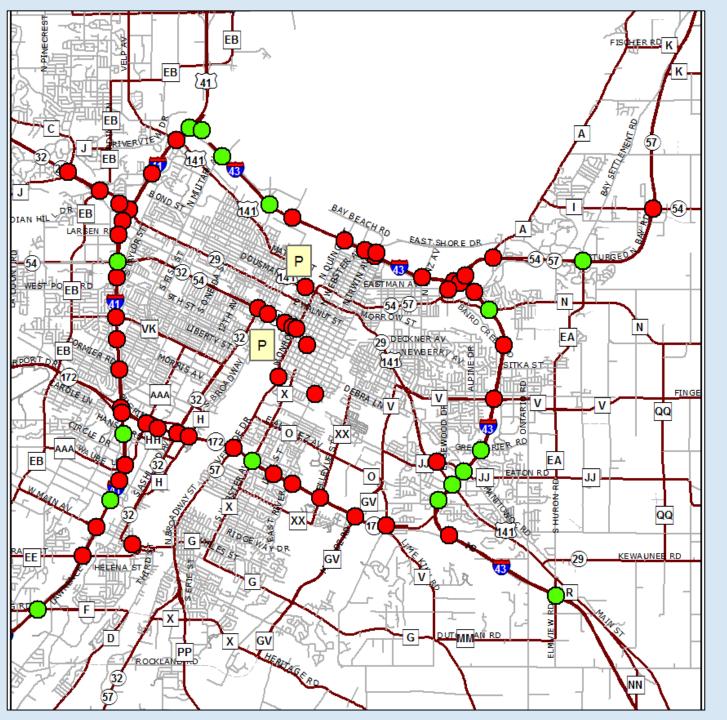
Wisconsin DOT OSOW High Clearance Routes in the Green Bay Area



Considerations when Identifying the OSOW Truck Routes:

- Conflicts with permanent overhead structures (overpasses, train trestles, skywalks, etc.).
- Designated heavy truck routes.
- Highway/street jurisdiction.
- Functional classification (to determine federal transportation funding eligibility).
- Pavement width.
- Pavement type (concrete vs. asphalt).
- Structural sufficiency of bridges.





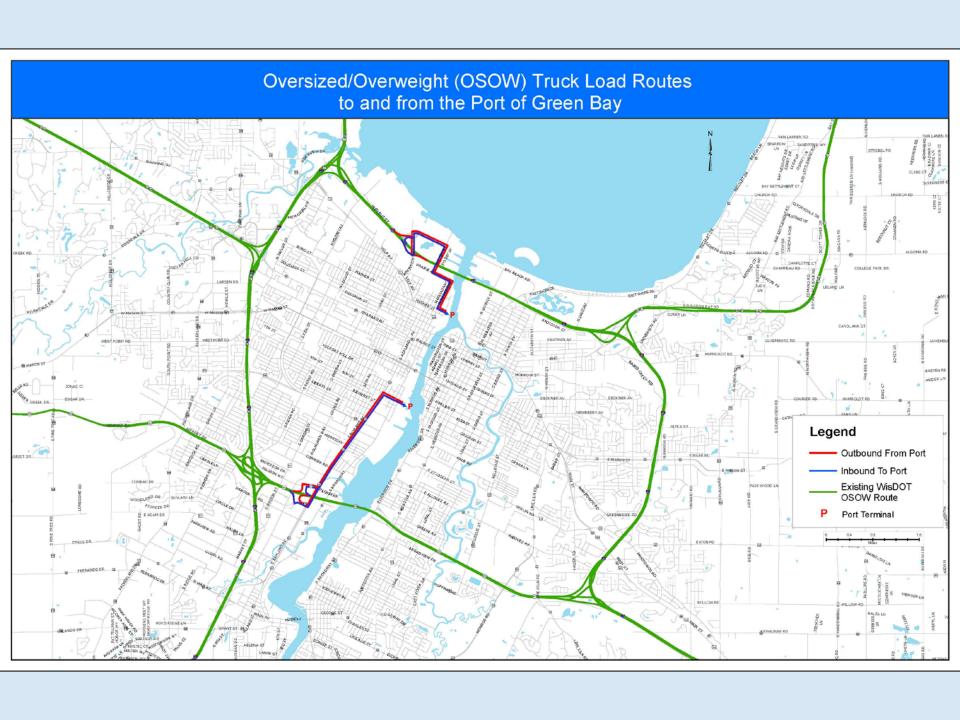
Red Dots:

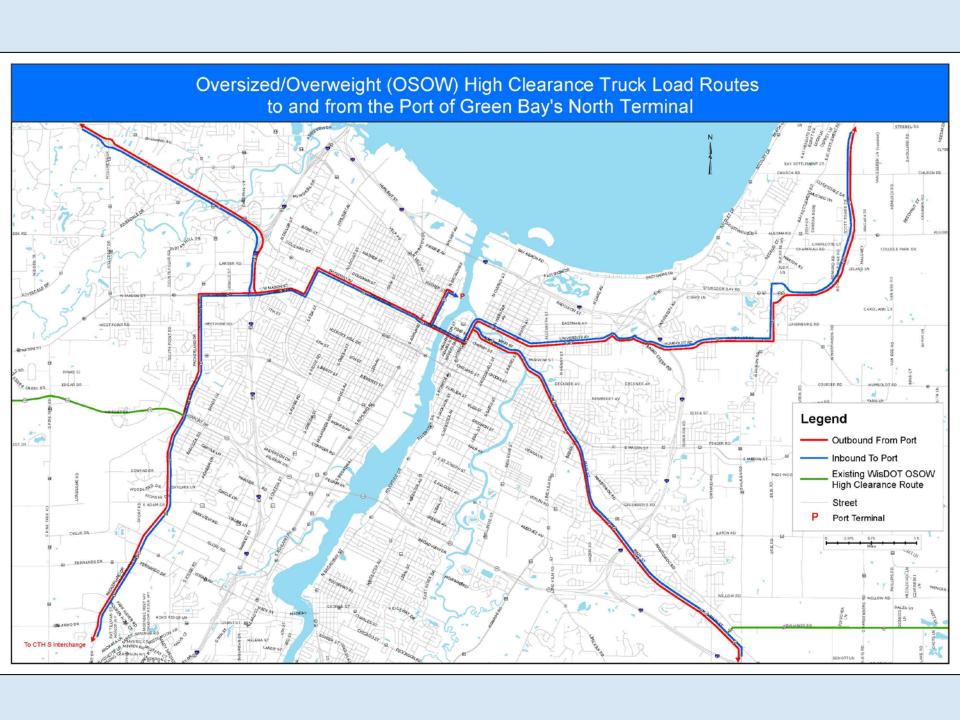
Conflicts with permanent overhead structures when traveling to & from the Port of Green Bay.

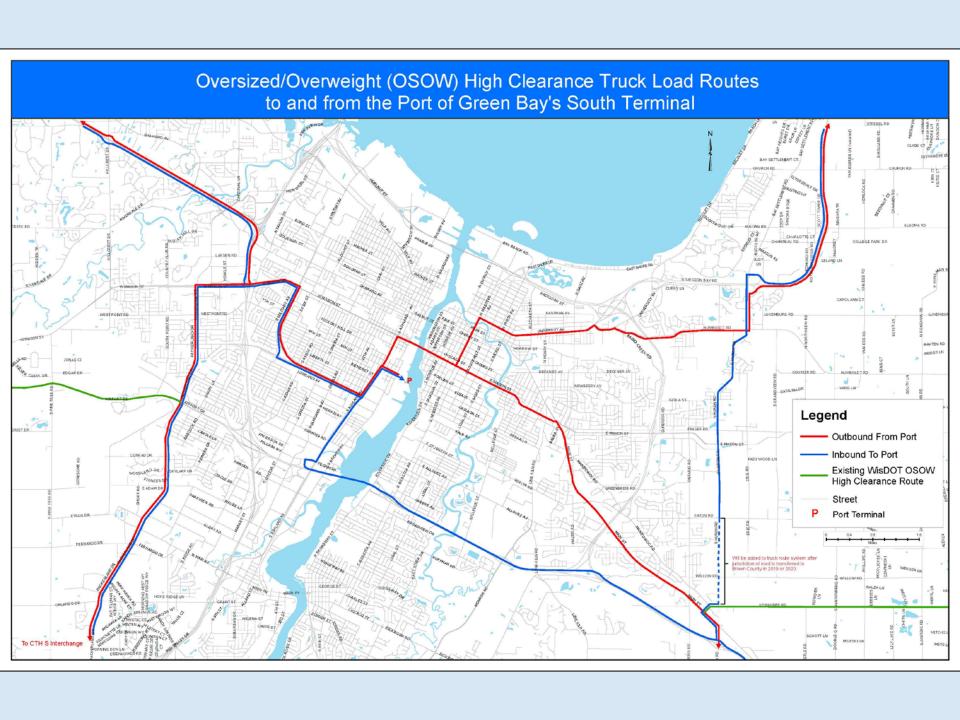
Study Process

- Developed draft OSOW and OSOW High Clearance route maps using the seven considerations.
- Met with & talked to reps of all affected street & highway jurisdictions (GB, BC, Bellevue) about the draft routes.
- Revised draft route maps based on these meetings & discussions.
- Presented the revised draft route maps to reps of the affected jurisdictions.
- Received agreement from jurisdiction reps.

<u>Important</u>: OSOW shippers will still need to obtain permits from the affected jurisdictions to use the OSOW routes.







Uses for the OSOW Truck Route Maps

 Jurisdictions will use the maps when reviewing street reconstruction & community development plans/proposals to avoid creating OSOW load barriers.

 These routes can be considered for improvements that will enhance their usefulness as OSOW routes (burying power lines, etc.).
