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Ice Safety

If you say the words "ice fishing" to anyone in Wisconsin, it will conjure up beloved childhood memories, feelings of pride and culture, and one or two "big fish" stories. The sport's history dates back to well over 2,000 years ago, to Indigenous peoples living in what is now the United States and Canada, and is both a culturally relevant and enjoyable recreational activity to this day. Ice fishing is an important industry for local economies and for the WDNR's management of fish population.

The successful rescue of 40 fishermen who were left stranded on a chunk of ice that broke away from shore on Jan. 9th was thankfully free of injury. The event shed light on the importance of ice safety and proper monitoring of the ice pack, weather conditions, and the shipping channel.

The shipping season for the Port of Green Bay extends into January if the weather and ice allow. The U.S. Coast Guard performs ice-breaking activities for late season barges to travel the shipping routes. In an interview with WSAW-TV, Port Director Dean Haen explained "They're moving through what little ice is there on their own. So a ship is able to break 6 to

8 inches of ice on their own," said Haen. The U.S. Coast Guard performed ice breaking operations in the waters of Green Bay on January 18th.

The Port of Green Bay and the U.S. Coast Guard urge that those who seek to recreate on the ice take all necessary steps to ensure their safety while on the ice. "U.S. Coast Guard balances the needs of our Marine Transportation System and recreational users during winter months; our focus continues to assist commercial entities with moving cargo and fuel throughout Lake Michigan," said Captain Don Montoro, Commander Sector Lake Michigan.

Please use extreme caution when recreating on ice-covered waterways and in close proximity to operational shipping lanes. No ice is considered safe ice.

2021 Shipping Season Closes Strong

The visit of the Algocanada, with petroleum products for U.S. Venture on Jan. 22, signaled the end of the shipping season for the Port of Green Bay. Total cargo shipments into and out of the Port reached nearly 2 million tons (1,971,592), a 3% increase over a year ago.

"Reaching nearly 2 million tons is a good sign for the Port and a nice reflection of the strong local and regional economy," said Port Director Dean Haen.

For the season, limestone was again the top cargo, followed by cement and petroleum products. Limestone imports (domestic and foreign) hit 639,357 tons, a 12% increase over last shipping season. Cement shipments reached 412,500 tons, up 5%. Petroleum products (domestic and foreign) increased 71% to 378,768 tons. While imports of limestone, cement and petroleum products increased in the 2021-22 shipping season, shipments of salt and coal registered declines.

Overall, 178 ships visited the Port of Green Bay during the 2021 season. That compares to 176 ships during the 2020 season.

"With the 2021 shipping season wrapped up, we'll work on plans for the next shipping season as our terminal operators focus on repairs and maintenance of their dock facilities," Haen added. The 2022 shipping season is expected to begin in mid-March to early-April, depending on the weather and ice cover on the lakes and bay.

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Ship Spotlight - Algocanada

The refined products tanker, Algocanada, is part of the Algoma Tankers domestic tanker fleet that launched on August 8th, 2008. This vessel was constructed by MedMarine Group at the Eregli Shipyard in Zonguldak, Turkey, at a cost of \$43 million.

The Algocanada and her sister vessel, the Algonova were built as part of a program to phase out single hulled tankers in the Algoma fleet, complying with new regulations. The vessel has 14 cargo tanks and two slop tanks. Included also are cargo, inert gas and tank drying lines within a clused trunk on the main deck. Able to push to a service speed of 13 knots, ther controllable pitch propeller is run by a MaK 9M32C disel engine.

The Algocanada is in regular service between the Imperial Oil refineries in Nanticoke, Sarnia, and Halifax, and in the Great Lakes region and along the East Coast of the US. The Port of Green Bay sees the Algocanada infrequently, but nonetheless welcomes her as she brings petroleum products to U.S. Venture terminal.
